# The Journey of Water

#### Geography:

Name and label some of the major rivers in the UK (e.g. Thames, Trent, Severn and Stour) including their source and mouth.

Prior learning: Studying the Amazon River (Year 5 Rainforests) and the River Nile (Year 5 Ancient Egypt). Locating major rivers in Asia (Year 4 Dragons From The East). Following the journey of UK rivers on Google Earth (Year 3 Best of British).

• Explain each stage of the water cycle — evaporation, condensation and precipitation.

Prior learning: Elements of the water cycle introduced in Year 4 Science.

• Study the formation of oxbow lakes: the build-up of river debris causing a meander to narrow and eventually flood and cut off the meander.

Prior learning: Following the River Stour through and past Dedham, learning about meanders: what they look like and how they are formed (Year 4 Dedham Vale).

• Study the formation of waterfalls and gorges: the process of soft rock eroding to create a hard rock shelf and a plunge pool, with the retreating waterfall creating a gorge.
